A Beginner's Guide to Growing Native Plants

Starting your native plant journey doesn't require a complete yard overhaul. Begin by converting a small area—perhaps a sunny corner or an existing flower bed —into a native plant haven. This manageable approach lets you learn and expand gradually.

Start with 3-4 hardy, low-maintenance native species that match your site conditions. Popular starter plants include bush sunflowers, sage, firecracker snapdragons, and manzanita. And don't forget the white yarrow and lupin.



Prepare your chosen spot by removing existing plants and amending the soil if needed. Check for guidelines THIS MONTHS EVENTS

on what a specific plant might need. Plant in spring or fall for the best results, spacing plants according to their mature size. Add a layer of mulch to retain moisture and suppress weeds (careful, this could inhibit your new seeds), but keep it away from plant stems.

Water regularly during the first growing season to establishstrong roots, but don't overdo it. After that, native plants typically require minimal care, having evolved to thrive in local conditions. Don't be discouraged if you lose some plants. It takes a bit of adjustment to make it work. Stick with it. As your confidence grows, gradually expand your native garden, creating a vital habitat for local pollinators and birds while reducing maintenance needs.

Remember: even a small patch of native plants makes an impact.
