Featured Sighting

The Western Red-Shouldered Hawk (Buteo lineatus elegans) is a striking raptor often found visiting and nesting with its mate and offspring in Madrona Marsh Preserve. Distinguished by its rich reddish-brown shoulders and barred chest, this agile hunter specializes in catching small mammals, reptiles, and amphibians. Its distinctive "kee-aah" call often echoes through the preserve. Look for it soaring above or in its stick nest high in the trees near Sepulveda Blvd.
