But it was funk and soul band Earth, Wind & Fire that stole the spotlight ROSE PARADE » PAGE 6



Shops begin selling legal pot

As of Sunday, the state had issued over 100 licenses to businesses

Californians lined up at dispensaries throughout the state Monday morning to be among the first to purchase recreational marijuana, more than a year after the state's voters passed Proposition 64, which legalized cannabis.

Whether they were celebrating a major shift in cultural attitudes about marijuana or just looking to enjoy the right to get high legally, it was a big day for the shops and their customers.

'What a way to start the new year," said Rome VanBergen, 57, who was waiting under a green canopy when 420 Central in Santa Ana opened at 7 a.m.

VanBergen lives in Long Beach, but Santa Ana was the closest city to have legal sales on Jan. 1.

'I don't really smoke it or use it, to be honest," VanBergen said. But as a longtime advocate for cannabis legalization, she wanted to buy taxed products and show her support for legal shops in hopes that other cities and states will take note.
